The Trinity: Taken for Granted?

s I keystroke this, we have just celebrated Trinity Sunday, which has far more to do with the nature of God than it does triplets, at least as far as my metaphor for it goes. The reality is that for most of us in a liturgical tradition, the Trinity surrounds us in ways we rarely pay attention to, and most likely, have become so used to it we don't even realize how often we invoke the Trinity on a regular basis. Before we get to thatand as we have unlimited space for this "soft" edition of The Order, a bit of history on how we got to have a Trinity Sunday on our liturgical calendars, and also a nod to one of the least known- these days- creeds in our shared

history, the Athanasian Creed.

The Athanasian Creed- named for the famed Church Father Athanasius of Alexandria- who was first credited with writing the creed although it is now thought that was not the case as it was not first used in the 5th Century and Athanasius died in 373. Regardless, its clear articulation of the Trinity has been handed down among all creedal churches and is often displayed with Shield of the Trinity (Scutum Fidei), with each member of the Trinity displayed with the words "...is..." and "...is not..." as a way of emphasizing the role and identity of each of the three. It is definitely found used far more often in the West than in the East, and at one time was part of public worship at least 11 times a year. Now, it is part of public worship- if used at allonce a year in most traditions, and that is usually, typically, almost always on, you guessed it, Trinity Sunday.

Within the Episcopal Church, it did not appear in the Book of Common Prayer until the current version in 1979 and is consigned to the Historical Documents section of the BCP.


With this historical background, what can we make of this doctrine that hopes to explain the Godhead of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit? There are several metaphors-St Patrick and a clover leaf, anyone?- one that resonates with me the best is that of water, and I use this as it is indeed the same substance, yet in different forms, e.g., liquid, solid, and vapor.

Ýou maý very well have your own, such as the different forms of love one can have for others, e.g., the love of a parent for a child, marital love in a marriage, and the love between siblings. The readings that most of us used for Trinity Sunday- especially the epistle and gospel- speak to the relationships biblically. When do we even experience the Trinity liturgically? Perhaps most significantly when there is a baptism, as all Christians use the Trinity in the baptismal formula, in weddings, as most clergy invoke the Trinity when placing a wedding ring on each of the couple's ring finger, and even the dismissal at the end of the Eucharist is almost always pronounced as a Trinitarian formula. I would challenge each of you who have continued to read this article this far to challenge yourself to not take the Trinity for granted. The next time you are in a liturgy, be sensitive to how often the Trinity is invoked- you could very well be surprised by how popular this particular "trio" is in regular worship!

LET US PRAY: Almighty God, you have revealed to your Church your eternal Being of glorious majesty and perfect love as one God in Trinity of Persons: Give us the grace to continue steadfast in the confession of this faith and constant in our worship of you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; for you live and reign, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Whosoever will be saved, before all things it is necessary that he hold the Catholic faith. Which faith unless every one do keep whole and undefiled, without doubt he shall perish everlastingly. And the Catholic faith is this: that we worship one God in Trinity, and Trinity in Unity; neither confounding the Persons, nor dividing the Essence. For there is one Person of the Father; another of the Son; and another of the Holy Ghost. But the Godhead of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, is all one; the Glory equal, the Majesty coeternal. Such as the Father is; such is the Son; and such is the Holy Ghost. The Father uncreated; the Son uncreated; and the Holy Ghost uncreated. The Father unlimited; the Son unlimited; and the Holy Ghost unlimited. The Father eternal; the Son eternal; and the Holy Ghost eternal. And yet they are not three eternals; but one eternal. As also there are not three uncreated; nor three infinites, but one uncreated; and one infinite. So likewise the Father is Almighty; the Son Almighty; and the Holy Ghost Almighty. And yet they are not three Almighties; but one Almighty. So the Father is God; the Son is God; and the Holy Ghost is God. And yet they are not three Gods; but one God. So likewise the Father is Lord; the Son Lord; and the Holy Ghost Lord. And yet not three Lords; but one Lord. For like as we are compelled by the Christian verity; to acknowledge every Person by himself to be God and Lord; So are we forbidden by the Catholic religion; to say, There are three Gods, or three Lords. The Father is made of none; neither created, nor begotten. The Son is of the Father alone; not made, nor created; but begotten. The Holy Ghost is of the Father and of the Son; neither made, nor created, nor begotten; but proceeding. So there is one Father, not three Fathers; one Son, not three Sons; one Holy Ghost, not three Holy Ghosts. And in this Trinity none is before, or after another; none is greater, or less than another. But the whole three Persons are coeternal, and coequal. So that in all things, as aforesaid; the Unity in Trinity, and the Trinity in Unity, is to be worshipped. He therefore that will be saved, let him thus think of the Trinity. Furthermore, it is necessary to everlasting salvation; that he also believe faithfully the Incarnation of our Lord Jesus Christ. For the right Faith is, that we believe and confess; that our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is God and Man; God, of the Substance [Essence] of the Father; begotten before the worlds; and Man, of the Substance [Essence] of his Mother, born in the world. Perfect God; and perfect Man, of a reasonable soul and human flesh subsisting. Equal to the Father, as touching his Godhead; and inferior to the Father as touching his Manhood. Who although he is God and Man; yet he is not two, but one Christ. One; not by conversion of the Godhead into flesh; but by assumption of the Manhood into God. One altogether; not by confusion of Substance [Essence]; but by unity of Person. For as the reasonable soul and flesh is one man; so God and Man is one Christ; Who suffered for our salvation; descended into hell; rose again the third day from the dead. He ascended into heaven, he sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty, from whence he will come to judge the living and the dead. At whose coming all men will rise again with their bodies; And shall give account for their own works. And they that have done good shall go into life everlasting; and they that have done evil, into everlasting fire. This is the Catholic faith; which except a man believe truly and firmly, he cannot be saved.

ear Friends, halfway through 2023, and that we have funded most of the programs we approved to support at our Grand Prioral Council meeting in Washington last September.

We had a very successful pilgrimage to the Holy Land in March, led by our Chan-cellor, Pent Penton and his wife Cheri, and our group was able to see first hand the great things that the Infant Welfare Center can do because of our support. The IWC is one of our long-standing major programs, and for a good reason, as their outreach to women and children of all faiths in Jerusalem serves as a prime example of our mission of Helping Those in Need. Our group was also able to visit the historic St. Louis Hospital on the site of the first St. Lazarus Hospital, built during the Crusades to treat victims of le-

Our support for Rising Star Outreach continues to fund outreach mobile medical programs for leprosy in southeastern India, with our common goal being the eradication of leprosy during our lifetime. The leprosy vaccine project continues to develop, and we look forward to its progress and our further involvement in this process as it clears some governmental

hurdles.

The Delegation of Mexico and their passionate support of our two leprosy clinics in Mexico, both financially and personally, are truly an example of "hands-on" dedication to our efforts to treat the

scourge of leprosy in Mexico. The St. Lazarus United Methodist Hospital in Misungiwi District, Tanzania, is progressively becoming a reality thanks to the devotion and perseverance of several of our members. Fr. David Juliano, a long-standing member of the GPA and a Methodist pastor in Sebring, Florida, first brought this to our attention several years as an idea, not quite knowing how far this would get in just a few short years! Jump ahead now to one of our newest members, Joe Norwood, who is not even invested yet but connected us to an NGO he has worked with, Project Cure, and to make a very long story short, this hospital is now on the short track to reality! Coupled with contributions from the GPA and Fr. Juliano's church, an assessment team visited the hospital last month, approved the project, and by the end of this year, the hospital should receive a 40-foot shipping container with about half a million dollars worth of donated, new medical

equipment inside. When this St. Lazarus UMC Hospital opens, it will care for thousands of local villagers who otherwise would not have access to quality heal-th care. Kudos to all involved!

The Order of St. Lazarus, particularly the Grand Priory of America, has been extremely supportive in our efforts to provide medical and humanitarian aid to those innocent people suffering in Ukraine since the February 24 th , 2022, invasion from Russia. We have raised from the GPA alone almost \$50,000 since 2022, and with wonderful assistance from our OSL colleagues in Germany and the Czech Republic our donations have made positive impacts on so many people in Ukraine. These needs continue and will continue for many, many years to come, and with our hearts and wallets we can provide to many what so few have taken away. We are currently developing partnerships with several NGOs that provide donated medical supplies as well as shipping to Ukraine, and with limb loss being a major concern affecting over 35% of the wounded, both soldiers and civilians alike, we are investigating ways in which we can provide assistance for this tragic injury. The best way to help someone regain their physical and mental health is to get them back on their feet, and even if one or both of their legs are prosthetics, it is a major accomplishment. The irony of our work in this field is not lost, as we have done this in India with leprosy-afflicted patients who have lost limbs, and the best, and only way, to get them productive again is with a prosthetic aid. More to come on this later.

Your contributions have also helped so many in need in our local programs around the country, and you will read more about these programs in this and future newsletters. Suffice it to say that without your support as a member of the Order of St. Lazarus and the Grand Priory of America, there would be many more people in need around the US than there are today, but our work is never done.

In April and May of this year, I had the honor and privilege of attending the Grand Priory in Canada's two regional meetings, the first one in Montreal and the second one in Calgary. Our two groups have worked very closely for many, many years, and this collabora-tion serves not only to strengthen us as an Order but to expand our collective reach in providing needed services to those less fortunate.



ecently, the Imperial Calcasieu Delegation hosted two Giver's Candlelight Celebrations honoring organ, eye, and tissue donors and their families. This Celebration, initiated by the late Dame Nila Halloran, DCLJ, OMLJ, BSN, is always a very moving celebration of our local donor heroes.

This is our general order of operations for those unfamiliar with this celebration. We begin with remarks from the various organizations who assist with the planning of the Celebration, including the hospital, the Louisiana Organ Procurement Agency (LOPA), the Southern Eye Bank, and the Baton Rouge Eye Bank, as well as remarks from the Order of St. Lazarus. Our Chaplain then offers a prayer, and a reading from scripture follows. Then a representative of LOPA introduces the guest speakers. Most times, we are able to secure a speaker from a donor family and a recipient speaker. Following their testimonies, the candles are lit from our large candle. The names of the donor heroes are then read aloud one by one. As their names are read, if their family is present, they are asked to stand and be recognized for their courageous decision. We conclude with remarks from our delegate and a closing prayer. A reception is held after the ceremony to for the families to visit.

These Celebrations are always planned in or around Donate Life Month. This year, the 5th Annual Giver's Candlelight Celebration was held in Lake Charles, LA, at Christus St. Patrick Hospital on March 29 th . Our recipient speaker for this celebration was a double cornea transplant recipient, Neko. Neko spoke about her life before her vision troubles began and her gradual slip into legal blindness in both eyes. She relayed exactly what it meant to her and her family to receive such a gift and blessing of a double transplant which restored her vision completely. There were many donor families in attendance to hear their loved ones' names read aloud.

After the reading of the names, our own John Halloran, USA (Ret), LOM, GCLJ, KMLJ, SCrLJ, MS, was presented with gifts from LOPA and the Southern Eye Bank in honor of Nila's contributions to the creation of the Giver's Candlelight Celebration. LOPA donated a brick in their new memo-







rial walk in Nila's name. The Southern Eye Bank had a beautiful plaque made in her honor.

On the 26th of April, our second Giver's Candlelight Celebration was held at Our Lady of Lourdes Regional Medical Center in Lafayette, LA. The Imperial Calcasieu Delegation had previously held one in Lafayette in 2019, however, due to the Covid pandemic, there was a long pause between events. Our Lady of Lourdes was delighted to return this celebration to the area.

We had two very special guests speak at this Celebration. The donor family who spoke tragically lost their teenage son, Matthew, and they talked to the other families about how his life and death impacted everyone around him. They spokeabout his generosity and selfless decision to mark himself as an organ donor on his driver's license when he began driving. When the family finished their testimony, they introduced the recipient speaker - the woman who received their son Matthew's heart. Matthew's family had been able to meet Troylynn three months prior. Three years after their son's heart saved her life, they were able to listen to his heartbeat in her chest.

Troylynn told her story of how she went from being a fairly healthy person to needing a heart because of congestive heart failure. She recalled her three month hospital stay while her doctors searched for a suitable donor. When she received the news that she would finally receive a new heart, she recalled the joy and profound sadness for the family who lost their loved one. In the end, she profusely thanked Matthew's family for his heroic decision that saved her life.

The evening was a powerful witness to the absolute gift of organ donation. There was no dry eye in the chapel that evening, and the other families that attended to honor their loved ones were extremely appreciative to witness such a testimony.

Sometimes in our diligence to the work of the Order, we are not as in tune with the impact that our work has on those we serve. These Giver's Candlelight Celebrations are always a wonderful reminder of our mission and its fruits.


Tampa's downtown eateries for lunch on your own before attending the Investiture service and later the Gala at the Riverwalk Room at the hotel.

pril 20th–30th, 2023, nineteen travelers, ten Order of St. Lazarus members (including two from Reichenau, southern Germany, members of the Bailiwick of Switzerland), along with an additional nine family members and friends visiting the Holy Land.

Following arrival and overnight stay in Tel Aviv, on Friday, the Pilgrims met our very experienced and knowledgeable Christian guide, Rami, and driver, Nael. They traveled to Caesarea to visit the Roman theatre, the remains of Herod's palace, and the Roman Praetorium, where very recent archaeological excavations have uncovered the Praetorium cells where Paul would have been placed while waiting to be heard before Roman governors Felix and Festus. From Caesarea, the Pilgrims journeyed to Mt. Carmel, Haifa, and on to Tiberius, on the shores of the Sea of Galilee, our home for the next three nights.

The next three days included visits to Cana, where Jesus performed his first miracle, turning water into wine at a wedding feast, and

the married couples on the Pilgrimage renewed their marriage vows, led by Fr. Winston Rice. From Cana, it was on to Nazareth and then Mt Tabor, the site of the transfiguration of Jesus.

Sunday morning started with an Ecumenical Service and Eucharist, led by Fr. Winston, on the Sea of Galilee and then a visit to the ancient city of Acre, the capital of the Christian kingdom in the Holy Land from 1190-1291, and site of exceptionally well-preserved Crusader buildings and Market Hall and location of the Knights of St. Lazarus quarters in the old city.

Monday morning, after visits to Capernaum, Jesus' home base during His ministry, and the nearby Mt. of Beatitudes, the Pilgrims were off to Jerusalem, home for the next six nights, with stops along the way at the Baptismal site on the Jordan River and a visit to the ancient city of Jericho.

Tuesday, the Pilgrims started the day in Bethlehem at the Basilica of the Nativity. They ended the day back in Jerusalem, walking the Via Dolorosa to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher.

Wednesday, first returning to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher to visit the Crucifixion site and the Tomb of Christ, then travel to Bethany, home of Mary, Martha, and Lazarus, and a visit to the tomb where Jesus called Lazarus to come forth. Then back to Jerusalem and the Mount of Olives and Garden of Gethsemane.

Thursday started with a visit to the Infant Welfare Center in the old city of Jerusalem, followed by a walk across town to St. Peter in Gallicantu, the site of Caiaphas' home and cells where Jesus was held on the night of His arrest before being taken the following day to Pilate and where Peter denied Christ three times before the cock crowed.

Friday was spent in the Judean Wilderness, visiting the Dead Sea, Qumran, and Masada. Saturday morning started with a special Catholic Mass inside the Tomb of Christ in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, then visiting Ein Karen, Abu Ghosh, and ending the day with an Ecumenical Service and Eucharist led by Fr. Winston at the Anglican Cathedral of St. George in East Jerusalem followed by dinner at the nearby Christmas Hotel and packing for return the next morning to Tel Aviv and return flights


